Chaplain's Corner

'A new command I give to you: love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another.' (John 13:34)

Dear Parents and Carers,

By the time you read this, our Year 11s will have finished their GCSEs! I feel so happy and proud of them. If your child is one of them, I send a big congratulations to you for getting them this far. I may not see many of them around school, so please pass on my congratulations to them too.

As I mentioned last week, we have been revisiting the Fruit of the Spirit in our Collective Worship this week, starting with Love. The command that Jesus gives (in the verse above) isn't completely new. The Old Testament law has similar values to what we are going to see Jesus say next. What *is* new is that

Jesus is about to lead by example. It is also new in the sense that it is part of the New Covenant that Jesus ratified with his blood on the cross. In the Old Covenant, we could be right with God by right living; now we can be right with God by Jesus' work for us.

So, what is this new command? It is love. But this isn't just any kind of love: Jesus tells us we are to love as he loved. Gold Medallists and Record Breakers

Beatrice E and Casielle M (pictured right) attended the London Schools' Athletics Association finals on Tuesday 13th June at Mile End Stadium. Representing the school and the borough, which in itself is a remarkable achievement, they both picked up gold medals by winning their respective events of 800m and 100m.

Bea was super composed and in control throughout the race, maintaining excellent form on the shoulder of the pace setter. Year 8 Ecologists

The whole of Year 8 were fortunate enough to participate in a day of ecology workshops put on by the Royal Parks charity. Pupils rotated in groups between several different stations to learn about the conservation efforts being made by scientists within the park. With glorious sunshine and an expert team delivering the day, the pupils all had a fantastic time.

Sampling meadow invertebrates: Pupils used sweep nets to gather a whole host of invertebrates and were able to carefully tip out the contents into a bioviewer for a closer look. There were crickets, beetles and spiders galore!











Building birdboxes: Our pupils were extremely enthusiastic about doing some woodwork to build nests for woodpeckers. For many, it was their first opportunity to use saws, hammers and nails. They were delighted, even if some of the boxes were a little wonky!



Maintaining grasslands with Shire horses: After the Shire horses had done the hard work of mowing the fields, pupils entered a competition to see who could create the biggest grass mound! Never have teenagers worked so hard with a rake!

Monitoring water cleanliness: Pupils used pond nets to investigate indicator species present in the pond – the more specific species identified, the healthier the ecosystem is. Some pupils were brave enough to hold the pond snails in their hands!







Sampling meadows: After a full day in the sun, pupils enjoyed being able to relax in the meadows and conduct a sample of some of the plant life. Using quadrats and species cards, pupils sampled the wild plants that were present and removed invasive species.


Another Maths Win for Grace!

On Pi Day (14.03 or 03.14 if you are American), Think Maths ran a national competition where they challenged pupils to represent π in the most interesting way they could think of, using any medium at their disposal. **Grace E** in Year 11 combined her love of maths and love of running, and ran 3.14 miles in the shape of pi (pictured right), which placed her third out of over 350 entries across the country. She was sent pi-related prizes from Think Maths, as well as being featured on their website: <u>https://thinkmaths.co.uk/pi-results/</u>

Here's what the judges said: "In 3rd place is this 3.14 mile run in the shape of Pi by **Grace E** of Saint Cecilia's Church of England School. Grace did the run and tracked it on a run tracking app. We were impressed by the delightful and playful originality of this idea, with no-one in the competition doing anything similar. Making the route both look like Pi does and be exactly 3.14 miles would have required planning and not have been an easy feat."



On Monday, the next round of the English Schools' Athletics Cup was held and we had 54 pupils competing. All four of our teams qualified for this London final, where some of the strongest athletics schools in London were participating. There were some great performances, with every race, jump and throw contributing points for the team. Some highlights were the 200m races, with Amaru G (Year 8), Cassielle M (Year 7) and Ella R (Year 9) comfortably winning their races. Overall, our Inter Boys team came 5th/11, Junior Boys came 4th/10, Junior Girls finished 8/13 (only 10 points away from 5th) and Inter Girls came 7th/11. A huge well done to all. Despite the hot weather, a huge thunderstorm and a long coach delay, they were all in good spirits and it was a great atmosphere all day.

Finally, at another event, Freddie A (Year 13) and Ella R (Year 9) have both been selected to represent London at the English Schools' Athletics finals in July, in Birmingham. This is where all the best school athletes in the country will be competing. Both are competing in the 200m and have a strong chance of medalling!
