Science Enrichment

Every Wednesday for the last half term, a group of 15 Sixth Form students have been learning in vitro cultivation techniques for conservation of rare plant species. This

Lateral Thinking: If you have two coins totalling 11p, and one of the coins is not a penny, what are the two coins?


Cryptic football teams: Which team does this cryptic clue refer to - Royal glass house?

Science Update

Year 8 (below) have recently completed a unit on the periodic table and looked at the displacement reactions of group 7 halogens. They have now moved on to investigating voltage in a circuit.



Year 9 (below) have begun their Chemistry Unit 1 and have investigated separation techniques. Here, pupils are seen skilfully separating water from ink through simple distillation.



Year 10 (below) have been learning about acids, alkalis and making salts. Through completing serial dilutions, they were able to investigate the effect of concentration on pH and conducted a required practical investigating the electrolysis of various salt solutions. They are now moving on to biology and have been introduced to motor and sensory neurones through modelling them using plasticine.



Year 12 (right) are continuing with their assessed practicals and have been studying the rate of enzyme activity.

Table Talk: topics and questions from Religious Studies

This week, Year 7 pupils delved into the study of the person of Jesus. They began by exploring the historical context surrounding Jesus, sparking discussions on the similarities and differences between modern beliefs about Jesus and his representations throughout history. National Geographic has a very interesting video addressing the question '<u>Who was Jesus</u>?' As Year 7s progress through the unit, they will study the teachings of Jesus, prompting them to consider whether Jesus is best understood as a revolutionary, a teacher of wisdom, or the Son of God.

- What historical evidence do we have about the life of Jesus outside of religious texts?
- How has the image of Jesus evolved over time, and what cultural, social, and political factors have influenced these changes? <u>This image</u> can spark interesting conversations.
- How do Jesus's teachings about love, compassion, and forgiveness resonate with you personally?
- How do Jesus's teachings about wealth and material possessions contrast with modern consumerist culture?
- What do you think is the most important lesson we can learn from the teachings of Jesus, and how can we apply it in our daily lives?


