

### **Netball News**



# Table Talk: topics and questions from Religious Studies

This week, our Year 12 students have been exploring the concept of utilitarianism, questioning whether decisions based on achieving the "greatest happiness for the greatest number of people," as suggested by Jeremy Bentham, are a sound approach to ethics.





I would like to invite you to engage in discussions at home with your child using the following questions:

- Is it possible to make ethical decisions by trying to achieve the greatest happiness for the greatest number of people?
- Is it possible to measure happiness?
- Do you agree with John Stuart Mill that intellectual pleasures, like reading, are more valuable than physical pleasures, such as playing football? Why or why not?
- Can you think of pleasures that may be harmful, and pains that could be beneficial? How does this affect utilitarian thinking?
- How do cultural differences impact the way individuals perceive pleasure and pain, influencing their ethical judgments?

I am hoping these questions will spark interesting conversations about ethics and help develop your child's critical thinking skills. Feel free to share your thoughts and reflections with the RS department or reach out if you have any questions.
