### Message from the Headteacher

As I reflect on the past week, it is evident that pupils and students at Saint Cecilia's are making a huge contribution to the school and local community. This includes the student led charity events in the Sixth Form, and our student leaders offering their time to 'buddy' younger pupils, support wellbeing initiatives, lead on the Junior Leadership Team and serve as prefects. Beyond the school walls, our donations from the Harvest Appeal has provided over 300 meals for the Wandsworth Foodbank.

This week, Year 9 have mastered printmaking at the National Gallery, Year 11 have studied waves in Science, and Year 7 have been on a space mission! There was more good news for the Concert Band; after winning a Gold Award, they have progressed to the National Finals, in Manchester next April.

In conjunction with Everyday Church – Southfields, the school chaplaincy team have launched an after-school Youth Club for pupils in Years 7-9. The club is free of charge, and exclusively open to pupils from Saint Cecilia's. We want to provide a safe space where pupils can enjoy being with their friends at the end of the school day, if they choose not to attend one of the

As we look to the week ahead, Year 11 embark on mock exam assessments, and we would remind you (and them) of the weekly revision resources that have featured as part of their mentor and assembly programme. Thorough preparation and taking these assessments seriously will give pupils a realistic experience of what is to come in the summer, as well as results that reflect where they are now, and highlight how teachers can further support them.

I am thrilled to report that Mr Kaan Cengiz is the new Leader of Ives House. The announcement in school was met with rapturous applause from pupils and students. I wish him every success in this new role.

Finally, please note the update to the school calendar to reflect the additional bank holiday on Monday 8th May 2023, as we commemorate the coronation of King Charles III.

### **Sixth Form Party**


Freya M (Year 13) reports on the Sixth Form Icon's Party held recently:

## **Year 9 Master Printmaking at The National Gallery**

The Art and Design department took 22 Year 9 pupils to The National Gallery for a printmaking workshop on Monday 21st November. The workshop was a chance to work with art educators at the gallery and, under their expert guidance, experiment with drawing and printing techniques, using artworks as inspiration. On arrival, the group were given drawing exercises, starting in a room filled with Rembrandt masterpieces. Pupils went straight to work with timed continuous line drawing exercises, 'machine' drawings and using a rubber to draw light. From Rembrandt to Van Gogh and other artworks around the galleries, we went from room to room and were directed to draw particular subjects such as architecture or objects from paintings. These drawings were used as inspiration to create a dry point etching composition in the print room. The wonderful etchings are currently drying at the gallery and will be returned to us. Well done to the pupils involved, it was an engaging and lively creative day. Thank you to Miss Daisy Bernard and Mr Ivan Deer for helping make the trip so successful.

For those who'd like to try etching but couldn't take part on the trip, our department will be running an in-school etching workshop later on this term, more information to follow.

### **Young Audience Award**

Pupils had the option to become a juror for the Young Audience Award run by the BFI studios in the Southbank. Every year thousands of young film enthusiasts aged 12-14 from across Europe act as a jury, watch nominated films in cinemas and online, and vote for the winner of the Young Audience Award. Pupils were asked to watch three foreign language films (in German, Swedish and French) and then submit their views. **Martha E** (Year 9) and **Orlando R** (Year 8) wrote two excellent reviews:




"I took part in the Junior European Film Academy Young Audience Awards and out of the three movies we watched, including 'Dreams are Like Wild Tigers' and 'Animal', I thought 'Comedy Queen' was the best movie. I liked the different characters and the back story of the main character. This movie was not a typical comedy about high school. Instead it was a drama about how Sasha didn't want to be like her mother who committed suicide the previous year. Sasha does everything opposite to what she believes her mother would have done. The different camera positions and angles where clever, especially the handheld camera giving a sense of fear and panic. All the characters had different personalities and styles. I would rate this film four stars. It is aimed at kids in the age group 12 to 16." **Orlando R** 



"On Saturday I went to the BFI studios at the Southbank with Eliza for the YAA event for younger teenagers. Our activity was to watch three European films, which people from all over the world were also watching online and discussing. At the end everyone had to vote for their favourite one. There were only 30 places to see it at the cinema! The most popular film was 'Animal' from France. My favourite movie was 'Comedy Queen', a Swedish movie about a girl who wants to become a comedian while mourning the death of her mother. In my opinion, it was moving and interesting. Overall, the day was very enjoyable."

### **Philosophy Club debates Illusions**

'Despite the fact that Philosophy Club is after school, everyone was very enthusiastic and energetic last week, which is exactly what we need in this club. After voting for the topic to discuss, we agreed this week's topic would be: illusions. Mr Cengiz put up videos showing audio illusions - we were given the example of a 'talking piano'. In this illusion, lyrics of a song or speech are played back through a piano. It may sound confusing at first, but once your ears adjust, you can make out the words to the song played simultaneously by the piano, which is quite phenomenal. After, we studied the well-known audio illusion of 'Yanny or Laurel', which caused massive debates all over social media back in 2018. One student mentioned that they could hear Yanny, but started to hear Laurel when they concentrated hard enough. Others said that they could only hear one or the other word, and many others could hear both and even switched between them. Everyone had a different interpretation of what they could pick up from this illusion, which suggests to us that our senses can limit us from the truth.

The topic of illusions links in with philosophy as it is evident to us that reality is not what it seems to be. This is a key idea which was developed by Greek philosopher, Plato. He suggested that we can be deceived by our senses through all the material things we experience in the world around us, leading to the conclusion that reality is not as it seems to be.'


