Tomorrow is Holocaust Memorial Day. This solemn and significant day of remembrance is observed to honour the millions of Jews and other minority groups who suffered and died during the Holocaust, and to commemorate subsequent genocides and acts of mass violence. The student-led Collective Worship this week gave us all a stark reminder of the horrors of the past, the bravery of people like Sir Nicholas Winton MBE and emphasised the fragility of the freedoms we can sometimes take for granted.

Activity Idea

Have a discussion as a family on current news events. Use resources such as *'Newsround'* or *'The Week Junior'* to find suitable topics. Table Talk: topics and questions from Religious Studies

This week Year 7 pupils have been discussing whether humans have a soul, exploring the meaning and significance of the soul across different faiths. They learnt what Christians and Muslims believe, considering the importance of the soul for humans. They explored the scientific standpoint on the soul, addressing why science may reject this concept. These discussions have developed their understanding of diverse viewpoints.

We encourage you to engage in discussions at home to further enrich their understanding of the topic. Here are some questions to spark meaningful conversations:

- If you follow a particular faith, how does your religion explain the concept of the soul?
- How are Christian and Muslim beliefs about the soul similar or different?
- How do you think belief in a soul influences the way people live their lives?
- Why do you think some people might not believe in the concept of a soul from a scientific perspective?
- Do you believe that the soul is connected to our emotions and feelings? Why or why not?
- How much of who we are comes from our soul and how much comes from our brain/our DNA?

There are lots of films that incorporate the idea of people switching souls and being in the other person's body. One suggestion is *'Soul'* now showing on Disney+.
