Headteacher's Message

'Don't let anyone look down on you because you are young, but set an example for the believers in speech, in conduct, in love, in faith and in purity.' (1 Timothy 4:12)

The death of a young girl on her way to school brought a tragic end to the week and makes it challenging to reflect with a celebratory tone. Pupils and staff led prayers in Collective Worship and mentor time, as we stand in solidarity with school communities in Croydon against youth violence and knife crime. When incidents like this happen, it can be destabilising for young people, so we will be watchful for any who are affected, and have reminded pupils that the Chapel is a safe space to reflect and talk about these issues.

We are almost at the end of our series of Parent Partnership events, and we are grateful to parents who have attended and value the opportunity to hear from Year Leaders and meet children's mentors. I am pleased that many parents have been in touch to say how much they have valued those meetings, and I will pass the comments on to staff who have been very generous with their time during a very busy start to the year. If you have been unable to attend, please contact your child's mentor and we can share updates with you.

The Autumn Term is always an opportunity to re-set our high expectations and standards, so I am grateful for the high level of parental support we have that ensures pupils are attending every day, on time, in correct uniform and have the correct equipment. Teachers and pupil support staff are modelling what is acceptable behaviour in our school community, making it clear to pupils how our values and ethos are demonstrated in the way we communicate and treat each other.
