Chaplain's Corner

"Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls"' - Jesus (Matthew 11:29)

Dear Parents and Carers,

We continued this week with our Fruit of the Spirit series and looking at gentleness.

Gentleness is defined in the dictionary as 'the quality of being kind, tender or mild-mannered.' In terms of the Fruit of the Spirit, the kind of gentleness we're interested in involves showing humility and thankfulness towards God, as well as polite, restrained and compassionate behaviour towards everyone else. If we think about gentleness in terms of its opposite, we find that it is countered by a desire for revenge, a sense of self-importance or the expression of anger.

Gentleness is a gift of the Spirit, but as a trait, it is produced when a softened heart abides in Jesus. It may be a gift, but true gentleness also demands something on our part, and that is intention. By this, I mean being intentionally kind, compassionate and humble towards others, especially when they are facing struggle or difficulty.

Like many of the spiritual gifts we've discovered this term in the passage from Galatians, gentleness is inseparable from other traits. Jesus himself connects gentleness to humility in the verse from Matthew above. Gentleness can also be translated as meekness, which should definitely not be confused for weakness. Instead, meekness is the quality of having controlled strength.

It's easy to be gentle when we are around those who we care for, and who care about us in return. But to do the same for strangers, or people who hurt us? This is where gentleness is often confused with weakness. We fear appearing weak, fragile, or uncertain to others and, in doing so, forget that maintaining a gentle attitude is a surer sign of strength. We fear judgment if we are overwhelmed with emotion, when we should recognise that our ability to be moved, to identify with the suffering of others and to want to help them, make us better. I pray that our pupils, students and whole school community grows in this quality.

Favor K: "The French experience at the BFI Studios was interesting as each film had a different meaning and storyline. All of us engaged with the questions and improved our French knowledge."



Strike Impact and Changes to the School Calendar

This is a reminder that, should the strikes go ahead on 5th and 7th July, please note the following:

Cheers for Cheerleading!

On Friday 23rd June, Saint Cecilia's cheerleading squad took part in the annual 'School's Out' national cheerleading competition in Bournemouth. This was only the second time we had entered a team into the event, but this time round, the team had nearly doubled in size. We were all extremely excited to showcase what we had been working on and for many to compete for the first time.

After a very early 5am start, we made our way down south to Bournemouth. As soon as we arrived we entered the main arena where the pupils had the chance to sit and watch some of the other teams perform, before it was time to head to our warm up.

The pupils undertook a rigorous warm up outside before entering the official warm up hall. This included a pulse raiser, some dynamic stretches and a handful of mark throughs to familiarise themselves with the music and visualise the routine. The hall was divided into four different sections which allowed teams to warm up the different sections of their routine. They were allowed just four minutes on each mat which included, a stunting mat, a tumble strip to warm up jumps and tumbles, as well as a full size sprung floor to practise the routine once before the competition.

The performance was a total of two and a half minutes long involving stunts, tumbles, jumps, pyramid, dance and choreography. These were all marked by a judge who gave each section a difficulty rating and an execution score. Joseph E and Sukie C performed their elite tumbles with perfect technique, Matilda B, Mia W, Drew L, Florence C and Paige W's dancing was dynamic and Evie F, Tehya R, Emma H, and Mary A perfected the most solid stunts.

The routine performed by our pupils was outstanding, with only 0.2 point deductions throughout the entire routine - a huge 1.47 point improvement within the difficulty level of stunts and a particularly high overall impression mark from the judges. After the competition, we sat down as a team and compared the scoresheet from this year to last year to see where we had made improvements and potentially lost marks, which the pupils agreed was very valuable.

There were over 45 teams competing throughout the course of the day in different divisions. Saint Cecilia's Sparks won 3rd place in the 'Schools Out' senior 1 division which is a huge improvement on last year's 10th place! All pupils are to be commended for all their hard work, dedication and commitment this year. There has been blood, sweat and tears (literally!), but it all paid off in the end.

Duke of Edinburgh's Award

I wanted to do a DofE end of year round up as all our participating pupils and students have done so well.

Year 9:

At the end of May, Year 9 carried out their Assessed Bronze expedition in the Surrey Downs and we were pleasantly surprised not to have any badgers sneaking into tents! Pupils played a zany game of charades and some of the acting was superb. They also learned some Canadian country line dancing and showed off their gourmet skills at breakfast. It was a sunny and warm two days and the projects the pupils produced are incredible.

Next steps:

Ensure your child looks at their eDofE account to check they have everything completed and verified so they can collect their certificate at an award event in the next academic year. Be on the lookout for DofE communication letters and a parent information session in September regarding the Silver award. If your child is interested in doing Silver, but didn't do Bronze, they can be a 'direct entrant', but one of their sections will take 12 months, so is important to choose wisely and start early in September.



Year 10s had a lovely, but hot, three days in the New Forest National Park in mid-June. They impressed us with their maturity and their ability to drink so much water! We clocked a lot of miles driving to groups to fill up their bottles to prevent dreaded heat stroke, and we managed to dispense 135L of water. The pupils impressed us, as always, with their culinary creations and, with the heat and distances they had to travel, went to bed quickly and quietly after a giant game of 25 vs 25 football.

Next steps:

Some pupils (direct entrants especially), need to ensure their eDofE account information has been verified. Please remind them to check so they can receive their certificate next academic year in time for the award event. We offer a Gold 'open-offer' that they can start when they are 16 years of age. Please be on the lookout for letters and a parent information session so they can make a prompt start after GCSEs.

Year 11:

We had so many changes due to COVID-19 and delays for various reasons (mostly the aftermath of COVID-19) that this expedition felt like a long time coming. The Year 11s did absolutely brilliantly and were so disciplined, mature, inclusive and dedicated throughout. We celebrated a 16th birthday with cake and had some very good impersonations of me, Mr David Sugden and Mrs Sohang Tang. The hike finished with an extremely hot day and some very sore and tired Year 11s, but we are so happy they got through it all and did so well.

Next steps:

Please ask your child to check eDofE to ensure their admin is done in time for the award event as some sections are not completed properly. If your child wants to sign up for Gold, it might be wise to think about it now so that they can start their 12 month sections this summer or do the residential. Be sure to read the residential requirements carefully!

Mr Sugden and I want to say how proud we are of all of them and how delightful this year of trips was! Thank you to all the parents for your support along the way!
