
Year 13 Applied Scientists have been developing their aseptic technique, preparing streak plates of three different (non-pathogenic!) bacterial species.

Year 7 Geographers Assess Southfields

As part of the Year 7 geography curriculum, each class went to Southfields to complete a fieldwork activity. They were tasked with deciding if Southfields was a clone town. They completed a shop survey and assessed the environmental quality of the high street. They will be analysing this information in class and writing a conclusion of their results. Enrichment Programme Tackles Einstein



As part of the Enrichment Programme, pupils attended a physics session on Einstein's 'General Theory of Relativity.' The pupils discussed some of the basic concepts and how they differ from our everyday experience. Some of these concepts are very advanced and are difficult to get your ahead around, so they were really pushed to think 'outside the box'.

Pictured is **Hannah H** (Year 8), who is dropping a water bottle that has holes drilled at the bottom. When the bottle is not falling, water flows out of the holes (as expected). But when the bottle IS falling, the water stops flowing out of the holes. Einstein used this to argue that motion and gravity are really the same thing. This eventually led him to his theory, space-time, time dilation, etc, which has been tested over and over again in many different ways. Pupils learned how his theory predicted, black holes (amongst other things) and the expansion of the universe. They learned that without the calculations made possible by Einstein's theory, no one's SatNav system would work!

Table Talk: topics and questions from Religious Studies

This week, Year 13 have been learning about attributes and characteristics of God, such as omnipotence, omniscience, omnibenevolence and God's relationship with time. In the coming days, they will tackle the very interesting question of whether these divine characteristics are logically consistent.

If you would like to engage your child with the topic, I would recommend starting with the following philosophical problems:

- The Unmovable Stone: Can God create a stone so heavy that even He cannot lift it?
- The Dilemma of Foreknowledge: If God is omniscient and knows that you will choose to wear a red jumper, does it limit your ability to change your mind and decide to wear a different colour instead?
- The Existence of Suffering: If God is truly all-loving, why did He create a world that is not free of suffering? Could there be a reason why suffering exist?

If your child finds these questions interesting, you can help them develop their understating of this topic by watching <u>What is God Like? (Crash Course Philosophy).</u>
