# Trip to Spain

A group of pupils travelled to Spain last week and I am thrilled to share our experiences from their educational trip to Granada and Marbella. Our journey began with a mesmerizing tour of the Alhambra Palace, where pupils were captivated by its history and architecture. We were lucky to have two incredibly knowledgeable and engaging tour guides who brought the stories of the Alhambra to life. The exploration of Granada continued with a walking tour of the city's historic areas, where our pupils immersed themselves in the local culture. The Flamenco show and tapas evening were a hit, offering a taste of traditional Spanish music and cuisine. Pupils particularly enjoyed the interactive paella workshop, learning to cook this iconic Spanish dish.





In Marbella, our visit to Aloha College was a highlight, where pupils met their pen pals and engaged in activities that honed their Spanish skills. Welcomed by Mr Jimenez Aranda, formerly of Saint Cecilia's, this encounter facilitated cultural integration and language practice. # Spotlight on Science

It has been another busy week in the Science Department.

Year 8 have been studying plant reproduction and completed a flower dissection.



Year 9 have completed their first required practical on microscopy. Pupils used microscopes to observe animal and plant cells and used their phones to take photos like the ones below.




Year 10 have been investigating reactions of metals, looking at displacement reactions. Pupils have reacted metals with acids and completed the 'squeaky pop' test for hydrogen gas. They also reacted copper oxide with carbon to produce pure copper.



Year 11 conducted ecology field studies to investigate the distribution and abundance of plant species in our Peace Garden.



Finally, Year 12 have been studying biological molecules and learned more about the primary, secondary, tertiary and quaternary structure of proteins, by modelling the components and the bonds within them.

# Table Talk: topics and questions from Religious Studies

This week in Year 9, pupils have been learning about the central Christian belief of the Incarnation. The Incarnation refers to the belief that God came down to earth as a man and that Jesus Christ is both fully divine and fully human. Our lessons have focused on exploring the dual nature of Jesus and examining parts of the Bible that reveal his divinity and humanity. After looking at biblical evidence, pupils engaged in debate, contemplating whether Jesus was solely a man or the Son of God.

Here are some questions to spark meaningful conversations:

- Which biblical stories or passages provide the most convincing evidence for Jesus' divinity?
- How would you respond to someone who questions whether the Bible can prove Jesus' divine nature?
- Are there other sources or texts, outside of the Bible, that you think could provide evidence for Jesus' identity?
- Overall, based on the evidence presented in the Bible and other considerations, do you find it convincing that Jesus is the Son of God? Why or why not?

#### Something to watch:

*'The Case for Christ'* (2017): Based on Lee Strobel's bestselling book, this documentary follows an investigative journalist's journey to explore the historical evidence surrounding Jesus' life, death, and resurrection. The documentary is <u>available on YouTube here</u>.


### Netball News
