Perfection in Paris!

A large group of Year 9 pupils embarked on an exciting trip to Paris, departing on the Eurostar last Friday. Their Parisian adventure kicked off with a cruise along the River Seine on the Bateaux Mouche, where they saw key landmarks including Notre Dame Cathedral and the iconic Eiffel Tower. French cuisine is an important part of exploring Paris and everyone delighted in crêpes from the renowned crêperie, Frères Bretons.

On Saturday, pupils visited the Musée d'Orsay, taking part in a treasure hunt amidst masterpieces by Monet, Van Gogh and Renoir. They picnicked in the Jardin des Tuileries, honing their French conversational skills whilst chatting with locals on various school-related topics. They visited the Louvre, where they sketched the enigmatic Mona Lisa before strolling down the prestigious Champs-Élysées, shopping and marvelling at the majestic Arc de Triomphe.

On Sunday, emotions were high as the group headed to Disneyland Paris. On Monday, their exploration took a cultural turn with a guided tour of the Latin Quarter, where they uncovered the rich history of the area, visited La Sorbonne University and paid homage to France's illustrious heroes at the Pantheon.

Year 11 Art and Textiles Workshop

Artist Jeannette Barnes from 'We Explore Drawing' led a Year 11 workshop on Urban Landscapes to help them start their externally set assignment theme 'Power'. Jeannette has led art workshops and courses for a range of institutions including the Royal Academy of Arts, Royal Drawing School and Somerset House. The aim of these workshops was to encourage pupils to use their own primary source photos and ideas, combined with supplied secondary source images, to take risks, explore possibilities and be decisive.

The process of 'letting loose' in this way encourages ideas and creativity and will stand pupils in good stead for this exam board set project, for which pupils have until just after Easter to complete. Pupils used charcoal, layers of colour and made quick structures to explore their ideas. Pupils poured themselves into the sessions and produced some great experiments.



Table Talk: topics and questions from Religious Studies

This week, our Year 9 pupils learned about the final days of Jesus' life. They focused on the Last Supper's significance for Christians and its connection to communion. Pupils also discussed key events, such as the tearing of the Temple curtain when Jesus died, symbolising the removal of separation between God and His people. This exploration offered pupils a deeper understanding of the spiritual and historical context of these important moments.
