Articulation Day at the National Gallery

On Tuesday 8th November, Art and Textiles A Level students **Zoe**, **Rebecca**, **Eduardo**, **Victor**, **Eve** and **Jeannier** spent the day at the Whitechapel Art Gallery taking part in the Articulation Day run by the National Gallery. They spent the morning visiting contemporary artworks by Zadie Xa and Donna Huanca and a film installation called Moving Bodies, Moving Images. Following this, they worked with students from other schools to write a script and present their own thoughts and findings on the works. The day gave the students a wonderful opportunity to meet the director of the gallery, work with curators from the National Gallery, learn how to analyse art at a deeper level and articulate to a group. Chess Club visit Bletchley Park

On Thursday 3rd November, we took the Chess Club to Bletchley Park to look at codebreaking during the war. Here's what Dominic (Year 9) wrote: "Last week, around twenty pupils (including me) from clubs run by the Maths department went to Bletchey Park on a trip. On arrival we went into the main entrance which was a low building by the car park called Block C and we began a self-guided tour around the huts and grounds. This was incredibly informative, as we saw an Enigma machine and several different exhibitions, including what Alan Turing did for code breaking and computing. An Enigma machine essentially scrambles every letter so complexly that the chances of breaking the code were 1/150 sextillion! After lunch, we were taken to the Manor where the people who were invited to work at Bletchey were briefed (they were made to sign the Official Secrets Act), and one of the huts where people worked, which included projectors showing where and how people worked. In addition, there were some



things to interact with to see probability problems and why it was such a challenge to break code.

We had an hour long workshop, which personally was my favourite part, which showed how an Enigma machine was set up and why the Nazis thought it was unbreakable. We then went around the room solving codes to find out a spy's name and were allowed to use a real Enigma machine! It was one of the best school trips I've ever been on and would recommend it to anyone who wants to know more about WW2 or codebreaking! Bletchey Park tried to crack the German code every day throughout the war, shortening it by up to two years."
